



## Family Outreach Projects Teach Caring

The Outreach Team has had requests for family friendly Outreach projects. Here are some ideas thanks to Parents.com:

### **10 Ways Kids Can Help:**

1. Donate food to a food pantry. Have your child pick out one item each time you go to the store. When you get a bagful, take it to a local food pantry.
2. Walk to fight disease. Many organizations use walks to increase awareness and raise funds. Kids 5 and up can walk a few miles, and you can push little ones in a stroller.
3. Put together activity boxes. If your child is a preschooler, decorate shoe boxes and fill them with a deck of cards, small games, and puzzle books for kids at the local hospital.
4. Visit a nursing home. Your family can be matched with one person to call on regularly.
5. Clean up. Pick up litter at a local park or while you take a walk in the neighborhood. (Wear gloves and supervise your children closely.)
6. Befriend a mentally disabled adult. Call a residential treatment center for the developmentally disabled in your area and ask to be matched with an adult whom you can include in family events, holiday activities, and outings. The center will select someone who can interact well with young children.
7. Deliver meals. You and your child can bring both hot food and companionship to homebound people through a local charity food service.
8. Offer a lift. Take your kids along to drive elderly people or patients with AIDS or cancer to their medical appointments, or take nursing-home residents or isolated seniors to the grocery store or to visit friends.
9. Share storytime. Read your child's favorite books to children in the hospital. Your child can sit next to you and turn the pages.
10. Be kind to animals. Volunteer to care for abandoned dogs or cats.

Once you've decided on a project, explain to your children exactly what to expect. Be enthusiastic about what you're doing and explain why the job is important ("When we pick up litter from the park, we make it more fun for everyone to come and play here"). Answer your child's questions about the work and the people you'll be interacting with.

Above all, have fun. You might consider teaming up with another family, inviting one of your child's friends to help out, or stopping for a picnic in the park or ice cream on the way home. What initially may seem like another task on your to-do list can become a wonderful bonding experience for your family.

## In the Interest of Time

Time is the hottest commodity in our society today. There is simply not enough of it. There are a myriad of services such as cleaning, mowing, delivery of all sorts to assist us in saving time. We try to compile as much as we can in an effort to use what we accumulate in a particular way. We save it up for vacation, we attempt to plan our lives so that we save every moment we can for future use. We couple this with filling every moment with activity in an effort to live as fully as possible. We keep calendars with our lives scheduled down to the minute. We do anything and everything we can to control time.

The valuable minutes that you are spending reading this article are keeping you from spending time doing something else. Do you feel pressed, intrigued or downright panicked by the idea that time is ticking away? Or do you have a clear sense of your days and their hours?

There are Christian traditions in which the hours of the day are prayed. Namely this occurs in the Roman Catholic Church among the monks and nuns in monastic communities. Since the 6th century the following has been the organization for the Liturgy of the Hours or Divine Office.

*Matins* (during the night, at midnight with some),  
sometimes referred to as Vigils or Nocturns.

*Lauds or Dawn Prayer* (at Dawn, or 3 a.m.)

*Prime or Early Morning Prayer* (First Hour = approximately 6 a.m.)

*Terce or Mid-Morning Prayer* (Third Hour = approximately 9 a.m.)

*Sext or Midday Prayer* (Sixth Hour = approximately 12 noon)

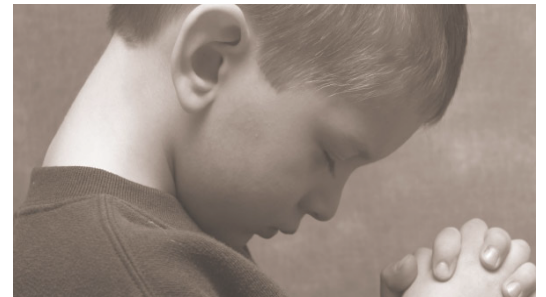
*None or Mid-Afternoon Prayer* (Ninth Hour =  
approximately 3 p.m.)

*Vespers or Evening Prayer* ("at the lighting of the  
lamps", generally at 6 p.m.)

*Compline or Night Prayer* (before retiring,  
generally at 9 p.m.)

12th century mystic Hildegard of Bingen wrote the following prayer. I invite you to pause in the midst of your day, perhaps each hour, and take just a moment to pray.

“Holy Wisdom in your power  
Hold us fast in every hour.  
Enclose us in your threefold wings  
Spreading to embrace all things.  
One pierces heaven’s height above,  
Another touches earth with love,  
The other moves with tender care.  
In mystery through the cosmic air.  
Holy Wisdom in your power  
Enlighten us in every hour.”

The set of materials we already own begins with Old Testament stories and continues with New Testament stories reflecting the seasons of Advent, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. Our new stories are designed to provide a framework and sequence for following Jesus' life. The stories are arranged in four categories:

2. Jesus Shows the Way of the Kingdom of God in Galilee
3. Jesus Shows the Way of the Kingdom of God in Jerusalem
4. Jesus' Disciples show the way of the Kingdom of God in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the World

## CROP WALK is coming! OCTOBER 2!!

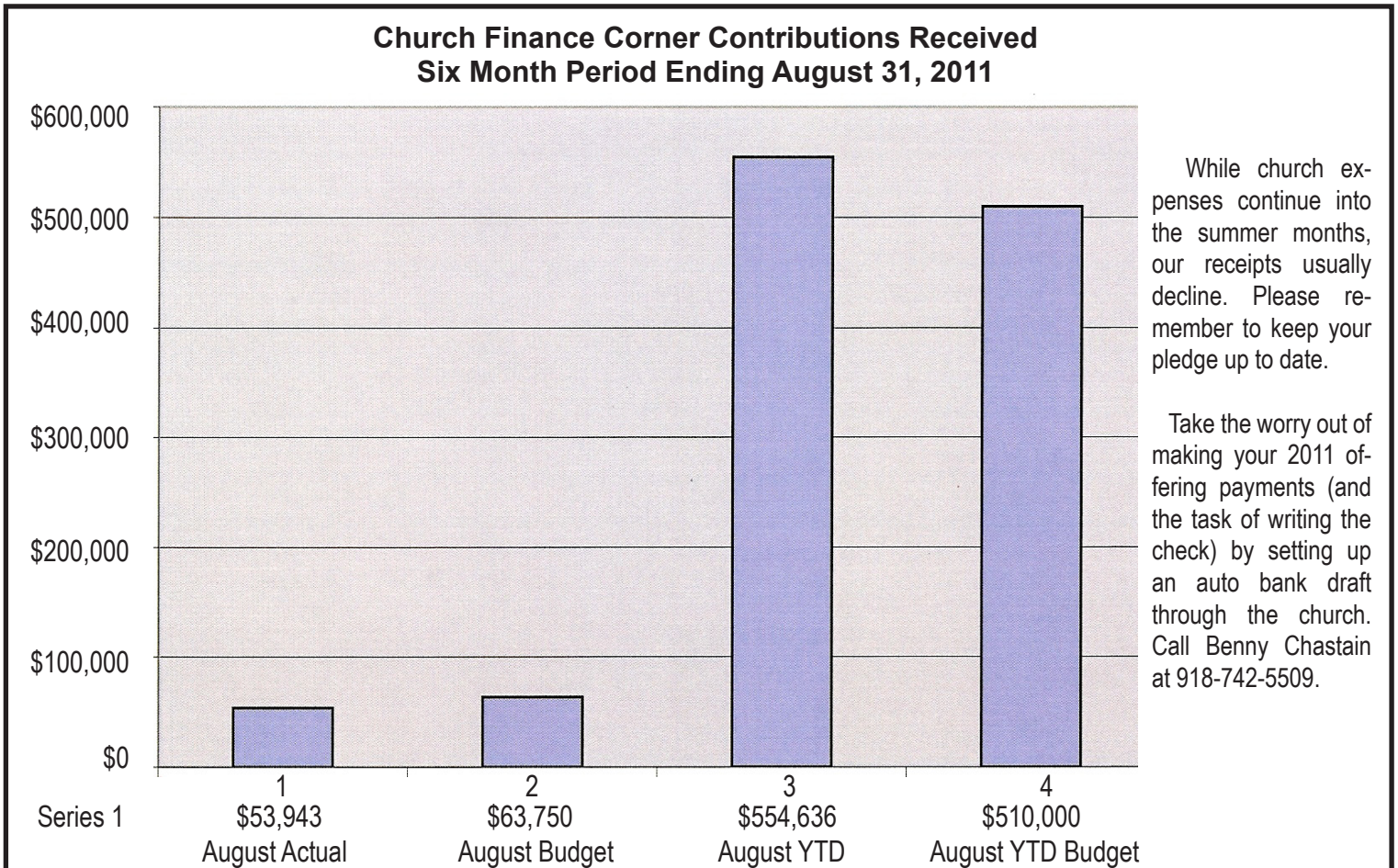
*Have you heard the news? Have you been under a rock?

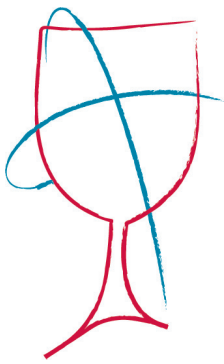
### Promotion Sunday/School Party – September 11

## Mini Mission Trip to Tushka, OK

*When do you think tornado season starts? April or May?* The answer probably depends on who you ask, but tornadoes don't seem to care what the 'official' answer is. The first US tornado this year was on January 1 in Mississippi. Since then, there have been numerous deadly and damaging tornadoes, including the EF3 tornado in Tushka, Oklahoma on April 14. This tornado left two dead and more than forty injured, while destroying a dozen homes, businesses and school buildings.

That tornado was quickly overshadowed by multiple tornadoes from Arkansas to North Carolina – all caused by that same storm system as it moved to the east. Then, only two weeks later there was another major outbreak with much of the damage occurring in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. A month later was the deadly tornado in Joplin. Now, 3 months later, Hurricane Irene is making the news.

The initial response to these disasters is best handled by organizations and personnel with special skills and training. But after the immediate needs are taken care of there is still much that needs to be done. Tushka is at this stage. Except for those directly affected, it is easy for us to be distracted by the media coverage of more recent disasters and overlook these ongoing needs. But these needs still exist. Fortunately, Atoka County has an agency that has funding to help those affected by the tornado. That funding goes further when volunteers provide the labor to repair the tornado damage. That is where we can help.

HACC's Outreach Team is organizing a **Mini Mission Trip** to Tushka **October 13-15**. The specific work to be done isn't known yet, but possibilities include cleaning, meal prep, debris removal, replacing windows and doors, hanging sheet rock, building or repairing porches, repairing roofs, etc. No special skills are needed – anyone can help. We plan to work Thursday through Saturday, Oct 13-15. You can come and help any day or days you are available.

We will be sleeping on air mattresses on the floor in an area church and meals will be provided by our Outreach Team. The only cost will be transportation. We will coordinate carpooling to get everyone to Tushka and back.

If you haven't been able to go on other mission trips because of the time away from home or work, this is your chance. Tushka is two and a half hours away and you can go for however long you can get away. A mission trip is a great time to get to really know others like you who have a heart to serve.
